

The Five 'R's

The Christian life is so often misunderstood by people. Often they think of it as a series of principles or a lifestyle. Instead the Christian life is Jesus Christ coming into our

lives to enable us by His indwelling power to let Him demonstrate His strength, His glory, His sufficiency, His faithfulness. Faith allows us to trust in such a way that this is the manifestation of our lives.

One moment that is crystallised in my heart occurred when listening to a missionary speaking. I was sitting behind some kids who were really misbehaving. When we got up I said "Y'll, you were awful. This is a Christian school and you are supposed to act like Christians." Then I walked out and it hit me.

Wait a minute – is Christianity an act? No! Christianity is not an act that we put on. Instead Christianity is the out flowing of the indwelling life of Christ.

Now how do we allow that life to flow? Jesus said "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman...he that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:1,5). How do you abide in Him? How do you allow that life to flow so the fruit can grow?

The first thing is to Rely on Him. Through the years there have been many

times of God's provision of faithfulness when I have

had nothing to rely on but Him. God has repeatedly used ballet to reinforce this in my life. He gave me back ballet, and then opened the door for it to develop into a ministry through a ballet school. Whenever we have big productions it's a matter of just relying on the Lord. It's beyond me, I cannot do it and yet He can, so He calls us to this utter relying. He lives in us and is available to us (Jer. 33:3; Phil. 4:13). But how do I know what I have to rely on?

Retain I have to Retain His word in my heart. If I

want to rely on Him, I cannot dream up

what to rely on Him for, but must rely on what He has promised in His Word. Having faith is not just believing, for believing something does not make it true. Faith is what attaches me to truth and that truth is God in Jesus Christ and His promises.

It's not how much faith you have, but what is the object of your faith. It is Jesus Christ. He is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all we can ask or think (Eph. 3:20). Faith

comes by hearing and hearing by His word

(Rom. 10:17).

As I come to His Word I

know Him and to know Relinguish

must Relinquish as I find things in His Word that conflict with my own will. I can give many illustrations of these places in my life where God has held back His blessings, held back the flow of His power because of an unwillingness of mine to deal with something. Praise God He breaks us. He loves us enough not to leave us in that place. "Whom the Lord

loves He chastens, and scourges every son whom He receives ...that we may be partakers of His holiness" (Heb. 12:6,10).

Request

And then Request. If I really want to have that vital life, I need to depend on Him by asking. Prayer honours God. Prayer is saying I know what a great God you are. I know nothing is

impossible with you. I know that you will not give me a stone if I ask for bread! Jesus asked the blind man 'What do you want me to do for you?' (Luke 18:41). And I thought, 'Jesus – why do you ask?' – look at him! But Jesus wanted the man to identify his needs with Christ's ability.

Finally **Resist**. Because when you are being Resist fruitfully

connected to Him, the enemy of God will come against us. He will come with deceptions, through the world, through our own flesh - which though it has lost its power to dominate, is still there to war against us. So we have to learn to stand.

The Christian life is the most exciting privilege any mortal man could ever have. God

Himself came to pay the debt of our sin so He can accomplish in us what He called us for, chosen in him before the foundation of the world that we should be holy and without blame before him in a love relationship (Eph. 1:4). The reason that He saved us was to remake us (Rom. 8:29; 1 John 3:2,3).

Down in Dunedin



Grace Bible Church Dunedin began their conference, on Friday 22nd of May, with Barbara Barker sharing her testimony, followed by coffee and dessert. Through the medium of her experience, Barbara shared about God's faithfulness, explaining that a genuine life of faith is one lived in imitation and reflection of Him.

On Saturday Barbara opened, teaching about the outworking of true faith in our lives, pointing out that "to live for Him is what it is all about – all else is shadows." The following discussion and Scripture study explored our tendency to sin and guarding ourselves from sin's snares.

Later Denise Hamilton spoke about the reality of trials in our lives and the importance of making God and His truths our focus. Barbara closed with the story of the Briarwood Ballet School and its ministry,

including DVD exerpts of a recent, stunning performance. Her message: "Satan can't do anything except lay a stage on which God will do something bigger!"

The conference was enjoyed by all; many valuing Barbara's real and humble manner, Denise's clarity and humour, and their honest openness.

Another First for New Plymouth



Thursday 28th May was a very special day in the life of Grace Community Church of New Plymouth and especially for the women.

As a new church we have gone through many phases. As far as premises go, we have moved from meeting in a house to a small sports hall, to a bigger school hall and finally to a bigger Community hall with separate and ample room for Church, Sunday School and for Babies & Toddlers.

The moves were very necessary each time because of, praise God, growth in our numbers. We now at last feel our moving has come to an end but we all pray and have faith that our growth in number and most of all our spiritual growth will continue.

Betty Matthews, another pastor's wife from the USA accompanied them and her input in the conference was to chat and share with everyone on a one-to-one basis. Let us not forget our lovely Nola Young who traveled all over the country with the three ladies as they visited as many Grace Churches in NZ as possible on their two week visit.

But enough of the peripherals. You might ask what about the Word of God and the challenge mentioned earlier.

Denise gave us a short, humorous and memorable 15 minute talk on faith especially as it related to trials and this was followed by the main speaker, Barbara.

Barbara's 50 minute talk continued the theme of "Living by Faith in the Nitty Gritty of Life". It was centered on her testimony and especially around her years as a single woman in her early 20's and then as a young mother with three young children. In her talk she referred to them as "My 3 and a half, my 2 and a half and my half year old", which in itself told a story. She shared about the challenges in her life as the wife of a busy pastor and that of a young Christian mother. Her talk was a tremendous testimony, a real spiritual challenge and although it was based around her life, she brought out God's Word in a wonderful way as she quoted scripture after scripture and explained the application in our lives.

The Challenge of Ministry

Barbara Barker speaks on Isaiah 43

(Barbara spoke on the final Sunday afternoon in Auckland to a room full of women who were involved in ministry in different capacities. Unfortunately the message was not recorded but we asked Barbara to write something that carried a similar theme. – Ed.)

In Isaiah 43:10, God declares to His people, "You are my witnesses, saith the Lord, my servant, whom I have chosen,

that you may know me and believe me and understand that I am He." Jesus came as a servant, and so was a witness to God's love, purpose and priority of humility and selflessness. Our calling is to serve those to whom Jesus sends us and point them to Him.

But what does this practically mean for us in ministry positions? As a pastor's wife, I would find myself "playing the martyr", complaining to Frank about the endless stream of needy people in our home. His response was, "Barbara, if you complain about the cost of ministry, God will remove the

privilege of ministry." He would remind me of God providing the Gospel, His Spirit and His truth, His love and acceptance, and then giving me the privilege to distribute it as His steward. "But as we were allowed of God to be put in trust with the gospel, even so we speak, not as pleasing man, but God who trieth the heart" (1 Thess. 2:4).

We are called to imitate the selfless serving of Jesus, presenting ourselves to Him as living sacrifices (Romans 12:1). A sacrifice is the relinquishing of something important and precious to us, as an act of love, to gain something of greater value. And is there anything of greater value than knowing God has used you to minister His love, and truth, and provision to one for whom He died? We can sacrifice our time, convenience, resources, plans, emotions and natural affinities. I remember complaining to Frank about all the people who would come to our door, interrupting me. His answer was, "Ask God to put an angel at the door and prevent anyone from coming in unless He has sent them, and then receive them as sent by Him." When I began to receive anyone who came as sent by God, it really made a difference in the way I received them and could minister to them.

One very important principle of ministry is that we are the *branches* attached to the Vine, Jesus Christ. It is *His life flowing through us* that causes the fruit to be produced. "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, says the Lord"(Zech. 4:6). Even with whole hearted service we still must acknowledge that it is only by His Spirit that another life can be really touched.

Another lesson learned was that God will never do

through me what He is not doing in me. Frank told me that we could not encourage others to do what we were not doing, to trust God in areas where we were not trusting Him, and if His Spirit was not working our lives we could not expect Him to use us in the lives of others.

We must always ask ourselves what our true objective in ministry may be. Paul invested his life and labour, his

sacrifice and prayers into the churches: "That you would walk worthy of God, who has called you unto His kingdom and glory" (1 Thess. 2:12). But what was in it for him? "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ye in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming? For YOU are our glory and joy!" (1 Thess. 2:19-20). They were what Paul could offer to Jesus as the investment of his life. How determined we should be that the investment of our lives will be a praise and honour to Jesus on that day.

God reminds us that the fruit of our ministry may not always be immediately obvious, but He has also assured us: "Consequently, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord; inasmuch as you know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:59). When I felt that there had been no fruit from my ministry one of my spiritual mentors asked me, "And did God make you the fruit inspector?" She told me that my job was to go when invited to talk of Jesus and share the Gospel in the power of the Holy Spirit and to leave the results to God.

We will never understand why God chooses to use the foolish things of the world to confound the wise, or the weak things of the world to confound the strong, but He tells us in 1 Corinthians 1:29, "He that glorieth, let him glory in the Lord."

Key Truths in the Midst of Trial

An extract from one of Denise Hamilton's talks:

Trials are inevitable in the Christian life (John 16:33) but as we hold fast to key truths we will know Christ's peace and his sustaining grace.

- 1. **God loves you** (some starting verses Lam. 3:21-23; John 15:13; Rom. 8:15-17; 1 John 3:1; Rom. 8:35-39).
- 2. **God is in control** (consider Matt. 8:27; Prov. 21:1; Matt. 10:29-31; Dan. 4:35; Lam. 3:32).
- 3. All things work together for good (Rom. 8:28,29). As we keep these truths together, contentment will come and we will find strength to hold fast to our Lord and Saviour in the midst of the storm.
- 4. We need each other. We cannot do it alone. This too is vital for our endurance. Yet often we pull away from each other rather than pulling together. Pride, distractions of life, responsibilities, busyness, selfishness, a judgemental spirit can all contribute.

Some practical suggestions for encouraging fellowship:

- Walk closely with the Lord individually.
- Pray together.
- Speak encouraging words (Prov. 25:11-12; Is. 50:4; Eph. 4:29; Col. 4:6).
- Show practical care that meets needs e.g. meals, cleaning of home, baby sitting.
- Give books.
- Speak truth in love.
- Demonstrate forgiveness. Holding a grudge is like drinking poison while waiting for the other person to die.
- Be a caring and sympathetic listener and comforter (be trustworthy of anything spoken in confidence).
- Be transparent and real about your own life.
- Laugh together.

Denise speaks on Singleness

Delicious food. Christian fellowship. A warm house. What else could you want? Well, maybe a husband!

In Auckland, single ladies of a range of ages and situations gathered with Denise Hamilton for a Sunday lunch of food and fellowship. Denise elaborated on her struggle with singleness and how God had worked in her life around this and the blessings she had been able to enjoy being single. She spoke about the need for contentment in any situation, which is based on God's promises and provision for us (Prov. 19:23; 1 Tim. 6:6; Heb. 13:5; Phil. 4:10-13). She also spoke about the need to realise that there are advantages and disadvantages to

being single and married, but the problem is that both groups can desire the other's advantages — without wanting the disadvantages. Others also shared a little of their journey in this area, and of some of the challenges especially of being single in churches.

Overall it was an encouraging and challenging time. One younger attendee was heard to remark – "maybe being single is not so bad after all".

What God has done for me in Jesus

My daughter was getting a little puppy from a litter of puppies. We went over to the house where this litter was, to pick up the puppy. When we got there the puppies were so precious and I wanted so badly to pick them up and love them. But they had been wallowing in each other's messes and were so gross! I had this desire to reach down, touch them, pick them up and love them but I didn't want to touch them in their current state because I had such an aversion to that kind of thing.

Then the young lady who owned the dogs went and got a white towel. She reached down and put that white towel around one of these puppies and then she brought and handed it to me so I could hold that little puppy!

I just stood there and I thought "that's what God did for

me in Jesus". God's love for me was such that He wanted to draw me into a relationship with Himself but because of my sin and his holiness, he couldn't receive me. So he prepared a way, whereby he would send Jesus Christ to be that perfect righteousness that made me acceptable. He wrapped my life in Him and now I am in Christ Jesus and because of that I am in God the Father.

And do you know – that is the truth of all life. "God so loved the world that he sent his only begotten Son that whoever believes in him will not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). Now that we have that life, the desire of our hearts and of our lives is that the world might know Jesus. It is not just the facts about Him, it is the reality of His life, the reality of His truth.

Keeping Our Hearts Hot

An Extract from Barbara Barker's talk based on Psalm 71

The Christian life is just like physical life. I can become undernourished, sick, in difficult circumstances. So too, my Christian life can wither but for maximum health needs daily refreshment, daily provision and nourishment.

I have watched a number of people over the years lose their passion and involvement they once had in ministry. I have asked myself, how can I keep that from happening to me? The truth is that living the Christian life is day by day. Any change doesn't just happen overnight. It doesn't just suddenly go from the peak to the pit. It's a process. It's a gradual departure from that intimacy with the Lord, a gradually withdrawal from ministry.

While studying Psalm 71 – David's old age Psalm, some verses stood out to me as I struggled with this challenge. I want to make these truths a plumbline in my life. So everyday I make this commitment afresh, realising that its always straight to the Lord – I want to walk with you – today.

Ps. 71:14 begins "But I will hope continually" – that act of faith is an act of obedience. I choose to believe God. Faith is the evidence of things that I believe. We can all say what we believe, but until I act on that belief—ordering my life on the basis on what I really believe, only then do I really know what I believe. The choice to believe God is not based on what I feel, not what people say, not on what the world says. I choose to believe God. I will hope. Faith is hope directed to the future. I am going to keep my eyes on Jesus – the author and finisher of my faith.

And with that perspective and that goal "I will hope continually and yet praise you more and more" (v.14). How often we get caught complaining! - too cold, too hot, too long, too short - we seem to find a greater chord of complaint than that of praise. And the attitude of praise ought to be on the lips of every Christian. Every glimpse of God's faithfulness and provision should result in an overflow of praise. In Romans 1:21, Paul identified the lack of thankfulness as the point where people departed from their Maker. The act of praise on the lips of God's people is not only honouring to Him but it is uplifting for us.

"My mouth shall show forth thy righteousness and thy salvation all the day" (v.15). Don't be afraid to speak of what you believe. We don't want to offend people, nor to judge people but the reality of my life is that it is based on my faith in Jesus, in His faithfulness to me. We should never be reluctant to talk about Him in the same way we talk about our families, our husband and so on. So the more I speak of something the more real it becomes to me. 'O Lord, today, give me the opportunity to declare – to share your life, to share what you have done for me – the reality of you working in my life'.

"I will show forth your salvation all the day for I do not know the number of them" (v.15). This is the incredible reality — we do not know if this day we will ever get home. We think of those who have the 'death sentence' in them — yet we don't know when God's time is. No matter the prognosis we won't go until it's God's time. So I want to live this life today — in the fullness of what today has. I am going to walk with Him today. I don't know how many days I have

but I want my days to count. 'So Lord let this day count'.

"I will go in the strength of the Lord and I will make mention of thy righteousness" (v.16). Some days I wake up and it seems almost impossible. If I looked at the weakness of my body I wouldn't get out of bed. Then I get reminded that God gives the strength as I go. He will make all strength available to us. I can do all that he asks through Christ who empowers me. And girls, either it's true or it's not. That's faith. I have got to either know it and says it's true and base my life on it and live with that perspective or call myself not a believer. If I really believe it, it will affect my choices and the things I do. 'Today you have promised your strength. I will rely on you in this day no matter the circumstances that come'. I just love the whole concept of the manna provided – daily, not ahead of time, not more than I need at the time. I am not going to worry about tomorrow or the next day. I know when they come His strength will be sufficient. All I need to deal with is today.

Then the Psalmist says "O God, thou hast taught me from my youth" (v.17). Why am I walking with the Lord today? – He's kept me. He's kept me through conviction of sin that has brought me back to my knees. He has kept me through the experience of His faithfulness of His provision in so many ways. He is keeping me keeping on (see 1 Peter 1:3-5). He has overcome every obstacle that could keep me from the Lord. It is God's work in me, keeping me believing, giving me the faith to hold on – that He might be faithful to finish the work that He has begun. But that does not relieve me of the responsibility of obedience and faith. That is the faith that He will keep me keeping on.

Then he says "O God, forsake me not; until I have shewed your strength unto this generation, and thy power to every one that is to come" (v.18). What is the goal of our life? Paul writing to the Thessalonians asked "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown or rejoicing? Are not even ye in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming? For you are our glory and joy" (1Thess. 2:19-20). Investing my life in you so that you can know Him, you can trust Him and walk with Him. Now that is life! 'May I see the reality of you in my life – the provision of your strength, of your faith, hope, love; all of those things – let me be a testimony now of who you are, wherever I am until I have shown thy strength to this generation and thy power to everyone who is to come'.

So my daily prayer is this: 'I will hope continually; alright Lord I am going to believe you — an act of my will I choose to believe you. Lord put your praise and gratitude in my mouth, in my heart. Let me see your hand of mercy and grace. I will speak of your righteousness — Lord don't let me withhold that expression of my love for you or your faithfulness. Let me remember that today you will give me what I need, and I want to trust in you for that. And I will remember that I am only walking with you today because you have kept me. I have seen my heart, I have seen how easily I can be pulled away. Now as I am getting old and gray headed, let this be the daily experience of my life that my ministry here is just to let people see who you are and when I am gone leave a legacy to yourself.'
